English Angora Broken



Broken-Color is to include white in combination with any accepted Angora color. It is to have both ears colored, eye circles, nose marking, and body pattern. No preference is given to butterfly over evenly balanced nose spots. The body pattern may be in the form of a blanket (color starting at the nape of the neck, continuing over the back and sides, and well over the back of the hips) or spotted (individual colored spots evenly distributed over the back, sides, and hips), with preference given to the balance of pattern. Coloration is to be at least 10%, but not more than 75% colored. Note that wool length may alter the

appearance of the color present. Eyes—Color to correspond to the colored variety requirement. Note: The five points allotted in the Angora standard for color shall be distributed as follows: Color 2 points; Pattern 3 points. To be shown within the Colored Classification.

Faults—One or more colored toenails; unbalanced or one spotted nose marking; faded or shallow color. Fault for more than 50% color pattern.

Disqualifications from Competition—Absence of color on either ear, around either eye, or nose marking. Brokens so light in pattern that they appear to be Charlies or so excessive in pattern as to be Booteds; not representative of a broken pattern per ARBA definition. Excessive scattered white hairs or silvering in colored sections. Do not disqualify for white spot in colored sections. Eye color other than called for in the colored variety.
